The First Article

Daily Themes for Prayers:

How to use this tool

- For families, the head of the household speaks the portions in regular type with the rest of the family speaking the responses in **bold**. All join together for the Creed, Memory Verse, Catechism, Hymn, Lord's Prayer, and Morning/Evening Prayer. The Psalm may be prayed by all in unison, by the head of the household, or responsively.
- The family should aim to have the Catechism for the Month memorized by the end of the month (this may need to be adjusted for younger children).
- The family should also try to have at least the first stanza of the Hymn of the Month memorized.
- For a simpler order of Daily Prayer, the family/individual should use the parts preceded by a *.
- It is recommended that the family/individual follow either the Old or New Testament Readings, switching year to year.
